Profitable Culture. There can be no doubt that the tendency among horticulturists of the present day, to neglect the cultivation of slow growing trees, such as the apple and the pear, and to devote their whole attention to the rearing of quick bearing, but ephemeral plants, such as the tomato, is exceedingly injudicious; and, if persisted in, will be injurious to posterity.— So thinks the editor of the Newark Advertiser, who, while disavowing any intention of depreciating the tomato, which he likes to see in its proper place in cookery, is averse to its taking the place of the "good old apple."

There is some temptation to neglect the culture of a tree which, like the apple, requires considerable care and expense to plant, which occupies a large space, and is slow in arriving at maturity; and to pay greater attention to a vegetable which, like the tomato, is comparatively inexpensive in planting, occupies but little room, and gives quick returns. Still it must be considered that when an apple orchard is once established, and the

first cost incurred, it will last for ages, without much trouble or expense, while annual plants will be attended with annual expense and labor. It was argued once, by a Hibernian member of some town council in the old country, against incurring an expenditure for certain improvements which would benefit posterity, that as posterity had never benefit-ted them, he did not see that they were under any obligation to benefit posterity. For any American farmer or horticulturist to act upon such a principle, however, would be as ungrateful as selfish; for had not our sturdy forefathers planted for the benefit of their posterity, we would not now be surmanded with the many blessings we enjoy.

Another fruit well worthy of extended cultivation is the cranberry, which, in consequence of the demand for it, has risen from eighteen to twenty-five cents per quart. This berry is so highly esteemed by the English, as an antiscorbutic, that it is in great request among them for sailors.

Pears are also in great demand, and have fetched high prices during the present season Mention is made of a gentleman in Canandaigus, N. Y., who had sold the fruit of four teen hundred trees at from fifteen to twentyone dollars a barrel. The practice of grafting or budding on quince stocks, so as to obtain dwarf trees and force the fruit to an early bearing, is condemned, as it is rightly judged that such precocity is indicative of early decay, while the Stuyvesant and Endicott pear-trees, in New York and Massachus etts respectively, demonstrate the great age to which the tree will attain, and still bear fruit, if permitted to grow in the ordinary way .- New York Express.

Winter Feed for Milch Cows.

What kinds of feed produce the most mil in Winter seems not yet to be determined. Certainly, great diversity prevails in modes of feeding among the multitudes who keep cows, either for their convenience or profit, yet comparatively few are prepared to speak with any degree of certainty as to the kind of keeping which answers best. One thing is quite certain, that no kinds of food are yet known which produce equal quantities and qualities of milk as do the Spring and Summer grasses. But what comes the nearest to it? That is the question. Pumpkins we have long been accustomed to regard as among the very best materials for Pall feed, and they are equally as valuable for Winter feed as long as they can be preserved from-

Next to these, buckwheat shorts may be than the quality of the milk, but by adding about one pint of Indian meal to four quarts of the shorts you secure your quality as well as quantity. Wheat bran or shorts may be substituted for buckwheat where the latter is not to be had.

Carrots, beets, turnips, and roots of like nature are of great value, if not in increasing the milk, in refaining the flesh and health of the animal. As fodder we regard corn-stalks cut up at the bottom and well preserved with the husks on as equal to anything, none the worse we presume for the occasional ears which are left on the stalks when harvested. In connection with these, fine hay or rowen should be fed, say once a day. If you have none but coarse hay, it is much better that it should be cut and wet. Cows fed as above in warm stables and kept clean, will furnish as good a supply of milk as in any way short

of pasturing. You may, perhaps, obtain more milk per good hay or stalks, but in this case your cows will be short-lived, or their days for giving milk soon numbered.

EREASONS WHY HORSES DO NOT BREATHE THROUGH THEIR MOUTHS. The soft palate, agent is technically called, relum palati, is a sort of curtain affixed to the roof of the mouth, in the region of the palatine arch; it has a tree edge, which rests upon the epiglot. tis. It slants in a posterior direction, so that anything in the shape of food coming from the mouth raises and pushes it backward; but anything coming from the œsophagus or traches, pushes it forward and downward, closes it, and prevents all egress; so that air is expired and respired through the masal outlet, and all matter vomited from the stomsch must also be ejected through the nostrils. In the act of coughing, however, which is a spasmodic action, the air returns in body, and with force sufficient to raise the velum palati, so that a passage through the mouth

is at the moment secured.

The mechanism of the soft palate is as follows: Its composition is nearly the same as the hard palate, yet it abounds more in glandular substance and muscular fiber, by means of the levator palatinits substance is raised. On the lateral and internal portion of the membrane we find bundles of muscular fibers constituting a pair of muscles, known as depressors, which aid in retaining the palate in its place, viz., on the epiglottis. From th above orief remarks the reader will berceive that it is not natural for a horse to breathe through his mouth.-American Veterinary Journal.

TONATORS AND MELONS.—Use tomatoes largely, both at breakfast and dinner: take het or cold, cooked or raw, with or without vinegar, fried in sugar and butter, or stewed, with salt and pepper. Their healthful properties consist in their being nutritious, easily digested, and promotive of that 'daily regu lar action of the system, without which health is impossible. Their anti-constipating quality is in the seeds—on the same princi ple that grapes, raisins, and white mustard seed have stood high in this respect, the attrition of the seed on the mucous surface of the alimentary canal, exciting its peristaltic motion, thus causing regular daily action.

As to watermelons, they are the only things we know which can be eaten with impunity until we cannot swallow any more.-The best time for taking them is about 11 o'clock in the morning, and about 4 in the afternoon. They are not safe for very young children,—the seeds are especially injurious to them.—Hall's Journal of Health.


