A New Potato.

DECEPTION AT A CATTLE SHOW .- A most extraordinary deception was recently prac-ticed at a cattle show at Ayr, in Scotland, which has subjected the party implicated to n criminal prosecution. It appeares that a Mr. James Paton, of Bankhead, presented a number of fine looking animals for the pre-miums of their class, and succeeded in taking the first prize by a two year-old bull. Be-fore the animal had been criven off, however, it was discovered that he had been ornamented for the occasion with a pair of false horns, which had been skilfully fixed on the head by a band of gutta-percha, carefully covered with hair. In addition to this, the skin of the animal had been punctured behind the shoulder, and air blown, in order to correct a faulty hollow. An aged bull, and the third animal in the same class, had been practiced upon in like manner, but the deception was discovered in each case before the prizes were delivered. The premiums were then, of course, withheld, and the roguish dealer, together with his more honest unimals, ordered off the grounds. The directors bad further determined that they would bring a criminal prosecution against him for fraud. -

Apples make an excellent jelly. The process is as follows: They are pared, quartered, and the core completely removed, and put into an oven or over a fire. When pretty well stewed, the juice is to be squeezed out through a cloth, to which a little white of an egg is added, and then the sugar; skim it previous to boiling, then reduce it to a proper consistency. An excellent jelly will be the product.


