

About the Feet.—Water-proof Blacking
No. 1. A manufacturer sends us some boxes of "Water Proof Blacking," warranted to render boots, shoes, and all kinds of leather perfectly impervious to moisture. The request that it should be "favorably noticed in the *American Agriculturist*," and a long advertisement will be inserted. We can not oblige the sender, for two important reasons: First, "Water proof blacking" is not a new discovery. It is a well-known fact, and has been used for many years. Second: We don't believe in these water proof blackings, and of course advise people not to use them. As a general thing, blacking of any kind robs leather of its elasticity, and makes it stiff. It is injured, and the feet kept cold by it. It is not escaping by stopping the pores, with various compounds, tallow, etc. Not unfrequently a gill or more of water vapor escapes from the feet during a day. The amount varies in different persons, and with the age, physical condition or health, etc. In India, boots, or those of leather saturated with oil, grease, or other impervious substances being worn, this moisture is in a measure retained, though some of it escapes upward along the legs. Every one accustomed to oil or grease their boots all over, must have noticed that, for a day or two after the application, the socks get nearly wet enough to write on. India-rubber over shoes or boots, or leather boots, is well known; but it is not the mere contact of the rubber, for that itself would preserve leather. On the contrary, it is the moisture retained by the rubber which keeps the boots or shoes damp, and eventually destroys them. Latterly, since we have examined this subject, our practice has been, not to grease boots or shoes, even with tallow, except once or twice on the bottom and around the sides near the soles; and we are sure they wear much longer than formerly. The parts over the top of the feet are left as open as possible, so that perspiration can freely escape. This leaves the feet dry and comfortable, and the leather rarely ever rots, but lasts until actually worn through. If from any cause the boots become very dry and stiff, a little tanner's or neat's-foot oil is applied only to soften them. When necessary to wash through much water, a thin coat of oil is applied to the upper leather, to make the water "slip off," but not enough to saturate the pores. When rubbers are needed, they are removed as soon as circumstances will admit, to allow the leather to dry speedily. Nothing adds more to comfort, health, and durability of leather, than a frequent change of socks—two or three times a day when the feet are continually exposed to much water, or when the health is poor. The dry socks absorb the moisture, to the benefit of both feet and leathers. The best protection for the feet is a pair of leather shoes or boots with thick-uppers and especially thick soles—so thick as not to allow the entrance of water, or the free passage of heat and cold, but the pores so open as to allow moisture to escape. Coarse cow-hide boots or shoes are not only cheap, but are philosophical. Females, and men or children who are exposed to the wet ground only part of the day, should keep thick shoes to put on when going out; or have a pair of India-rubber sandals (shoes with straps and openings over the top of the foot), and put these on only when going upon wet, damp, or cold ground. —*Am. Agriculturist.*

WHITENESS FOR OUTBUILDINGS.—For unplanned surfaces, common lime whitewash, applied early in the summer when the wood is dry and the pores open, answers a good purpose, and is the best in the market. But whitewash may be rendered more permanent, needing less frequent applications, if sulphate of zinc (white vitriol) and common salt are added. The following particular directions for making the wash and for coloring it to any desirable shade, are given in *Downing's Country Residences*. Put into a tub or barrel that will hold water. Put into it half a barrel of quinine, and slake it by pouring over it boiling water sufficient to cover it four or five inches deep, and stirring it until slacked. When quite slacked dissolve it in water and add two pounds of sulphate of zinc, and one of common salt, which may be had at any of the druggists. Stir the mixture in a few minutes, and it will cause the whitewash to harden on the wood work. Add sufficient water to bring it to the consistency of thick whitewash. For the color of the above wash of a pleasant cream color, add three pounds of yellow ochre. For a fair color add four pounds of amber, one pound of Indian red, and one pound of lampblack. For a gray or stone color, add four pounds of raw amber and two pounds of lampblack. The color may be put on with a common whitewash brush, and will be found much more durable than common whitewash.

CURE FOR CATARRH.—The following simple remedy has been tried with great success by one long and severely troubled with this annoying complaint. Take, say one part pulverized loaf-sugar to two parts of pulverized camphor, and mix them thoroughly together, and use as often as the patient wishes in the form of snuff. This simple remedy, followed for a few months, has effected a cure in the case above referred to, entirely beyond expectation. Should the camphor be too powerful or not enough so, reduce or add a small quantity, as the case may require, as it is desirable that the camphor should be the principal agent.

A HANDY COVER FOR THE FLOUR BARREL.—Homesteaders generally cover their barrels of flour with a cloth loosely thrown over the top for protection from dust, etc. Consequently it is always coming off, and the mice are not kept out of the barrel. To prevent this annoyance, take the top hoop, after the head of the barrel is removed, and sew in white cloth; it makes a nice convenient and firm cover, thus protecting the flour from dirt and vermin. —*Rural New Yorker.*

DOMESTIC YEAST.—Boil one pound of good flour, a quarter of a pound of brown sugar, and a little salt, with two gallons of water, for one hour. When milk-warm, bottle it and cork close. It will be fit for use in twenty-four hours. One pint of this yeast will make eighteen pounds of bread. —*Home-stead.*

A late English writer says: "A sheep to be in high order for the palate of the connoisseur, should be killed when it is five years old, at which age the mutton will be rich and succulent, of a dark color, and full of the richest gristle; whereas if only two years old, it is flabby, pale, and flavorless."

The best cellar floors are made of water lime mortar and washed gravel; the good dry and cheap floors can be made of common mortar, mixed with pounded bricks and washed gravel.

The first cattle show held in this country was held in Pittsburg, Miss., in October 1810, and from that era sprang the system of agricultural societies and shows, as they exist at present, in most parts of the United States.

CYCLE OF PHYSICAL GEOGRAPHY.—In his last lecture the Professor said, that in the northern part of Asia is a difference of 105° between the mean temperatures of January and July. The winter of this region is the coldest known; the summer is the warmest of the latitude. The capital of Siberia has a mean annual temperature of 30° below the freezing point, but the mean heat of its summer is 55° or 60°. The summer there is two months long. In places, the ground is frozen 600 feet deep; the summer thaws it only to the depth of a few feet—two or three, and vegetation advances so rapidly that the Russians say you can *ager* the grass grow below a few feet of the surface, the ground in these regions has remained frozen for ages. (It will not spoil while in this condition.) That it is remained thus frozen, is proved by the animal bones—*flesh* as well as bones—exhumed from the soil. This antediluvian flesh when thawed was much repulsive by dogs. The mean temperature of the earth is not the same every season. Europe has no extremes of climate, as it is peculiarly American climate in winter is continental; in summer it is maritime. The coldest summer temperature noticed is near the mouth of Baffin's Bay, where the icebergs of the north are driven down by the currents of the Arctic Ocean.

BALL PLAYING FOR LADIES.—An exchange, in allusion to this popular and healthful exercise for young men, asks why the ladies should not participate in this amusement as well as in that of skating. "To our mind there seems nothing violent in the assumption that it would be as agreeable and useful to them as to members of the other sex. Very true, the exercise seems a little vigorous, but it is not considered too much so for the handsome Senoritas of Mexico, the gay and healthy brunettes of Sicily, or the olive-cheeked daughters of Paris. Of course, the rough features which make it an athletic game for men should be abandoned, and such improvements introduced as would fit it to the less hardened muscular development, and more refined characteristics of women. But there is no good and sufficient reason why the male sex should enjoy a monopoly of this most delightful and invigorating of all outdoor amusements. Girls as well playing for both ladies and gentlemen, and abolish those detestable, barbarous, brutal, sordid, murderous, peculiarly masculine amusements of hunting and fishing, and we will join the sporting circles." —*Life Illustrated.*

A PARADOX AND AN INTERESTING ANATOMICAL FACT.—Two persons were born at the same moment of time. After an age of fifty years they both died, also at the same spot, and at the same instant, yet one had lived one hundred days more than the other. How was this possible? Not to keep our words from being turned into a proverb, we are curious, but with reflection, a very obvious point in circumnavigation. A person going round the world to the west, loses a day, and towards the east he gains one. Supposing then two persons born together at the Cape of Good Hope, whence a voyage round the world to the west is performed in a year, it performs this constantly towards the west, in fifty years, he will be fifty days behind the stationary inhabitants; and if the other sail equally towards the east, he will be fifty days in advance of them. One, therefore, will have seen one hundred days more than the other, in the same place, at the same moment, and even at the same instant of time, as the calendar, and reckoned by the same calendar.

TEACHING IN A LARGE SCALE.—At a public meeting in 1855, Dr. Tyng narrated the progress and results of the school at Louisiana, finding that most of the soldiers in his army were unable to read, advertised for a contract to teach them. A single gentleman undertook the task. He asked for no books—nothing but slates and pencils. He brought up the men in lines, and by the use of large letters, at his dictation, they all learned to read in a few days. He then asked for one single tract. He was permitted to choose, and selected from all the tracts in the language, the most beautiful and affecting—the gospel by John; and in less than a year, he had taught 50,000 French soldiers to read the Gospel, and received copies enough to put one into the hands of each soldier. —*N. A neat method of supporting climbers is to take a strip of two-inch plank, two inches wide, planned the full length of the yard, and painted green, which set firmly in the ground, and next to it a wooden board, or toy store two children's hoops, one the largest and the other the smallest you can find. Now suspend the small one as near the top of the pole as possible, by strings, and fasten the large one close to the ground. Plant your seeds around the outside of the large hoop, and when up, run strings of soft line regularly from the top to the bottom hoop. It will look better to have the hoops painted green, and the twine should be dark and not cotton twine.
