Lecture by George Sumner.—The fourth Lecture before the Young Men's Literary Association of Montrose, will be delivered on Monday evening, December 26th, by George Sumner, of Boston. The lecturer is a brother of Hon. Charles Sumner, United States Senator from Massachusetts—has a high reputation for learning, eloquence, and ability; and his subject, which is of great interest, is "The treatment of the insane as received the warmest approval and admiration and attracted large audiences in many of the cities." Giddings's Lecture.—The lecture of Hon. Joshua R. Giddings on "Scenes in Congressional Life," delivered in Montrose on Wednesday evening, the 14th inst., before the Young Men's Literary Association of the course, has attracted a large audience. The lecture was deeply interesting. There were few finer or more thrilling passages than the veteran's description of the trial of John Quincy Adams, at the bar of the House of Representatives, for daring to present a petition signed by sundry of his constituents—how the whole array of slaveholders dashed and dummed by the old man eloquent—and the right of petition withdrawn from Congress, and the large triumph. And the lecturer's description of the scenes that followed his own attempts to vindicate the freedom of debate on the floor of Congress, was also listened to with intense interest. The earnestness of Mr. Giddings's manner, and his evident sincerity, contribute much to his success as a speaker. And the fact that he was himself a part of that which he describes—gives a peculiarly vivid character to his descriptions. And the scenes in our memories like those which he has actually witnessed. May the old champion of Freedom live to see this government restored to the maintenance of those principles of justice and equal rights, on which it was founded by our Revolutionary fathers.
