PARSENVING BUTTER WHILE USING FROM FIRMINS.—A writer in the New-Fork Observer furnishes and commends the following mode, given in Mrs. Cornelius's Young House-Keeper's Friend: After taking out butter enough to last a week or more, lay a piece of white linen over the firkin, covering it closely around the edges, and then pour on a solution made of two quarts of water, one quart of fine salt, one pound of surgar and a teaspoonful of saltpetre. Head up the firkin, and it it leaks out set it in a wash-tub and put in some more, driving down the hoops; every time butter is taken out, close the firkin in this way. It salt does not dissolve in the brine, add a little more water. Our recipe will do for 10 pounds of butter. SMOKE FOR THE CURE OF WOUNDS -- A COT respondent of the Country Gentleman recom-mends smoke for wounds in men and animals. He says: I, gut my foot with an axe. The lady of the house, selving the foot while it was yet bleeding freely, held it over a pan containing service unit freely, field it over a pan containing smoking tag-locks. In a few moments the bleeding stepped and the smoke was removed, and a bandage applied to protect it against accidental blows. The wound never suppurated, and consequently never pained me. I have seen it tried in many similar cases, and always with the same results. Let the reader bear in mind that no liniment or salve, drawing or healing, should be applied. You have merely to smoke the wound well, and nature will do the rest. I suppose the smoke of burning wood would produce the same results, but it would not be so manageable.—There is a principle in the smoke of burning wool, which, when applied to the flesh, coagulates the abunen, thus rendering it unsusceptible of patrifaction. The same principle stops bleeding by coagulating the blood. It promotes healing, and may be applied with decided benefits all uicers, wounds, and cutaneous disease.

HINTS FOR BUYING A HORSE.—Few persons are acquainted with the mode of judging a horse by the teeth. As the lesson can be learned by rote in a very few minutes, intending purchasers will do well to commit it to memory. A two years old the horse sheds the two middle teeth of the under jaw; at three years old he sheds two other teeth, one on each side of those shed the year before; at four years old he sheds the two remaining or corner (eeth; at five years old the two middle teeth are full, being no longer hollow, as the others are, and the teeth will have penetrated the gums; at six years old the four middle teeth are full, the tusks larger and thicker, and the horse is said to be aged.
