Landlord and Traunt Bill.—Landlords and tenants are mutually interested in a bill now before the Legislature. Under existing laws, three months' notice to a tenant is required to be given before the end of his year, before he can be ejected from the premises. But it has impresed, not unfrequently, that both landlord and tenant have lost the date of entry. In one case of this kind, in Philadelphia, the tenant actually lived in a house for twenty years, and cannot be put out because the present owner does not know when to give him proper no the to quit. The bill alinded to proposes to remedy such cases as this by requiring either party, upon an order issued by Court, to produce the lease or in either of them has the lease the Court may adjudicate the matter. For a very sovere case, make a wash for the throat of blood root, golden seal and palverized bayberry. 
