Cheese Factory in Springville.

Mr. Editor:—As you have a desire to keep your readers informed of any improvements taking place in the County, it occured to me that it was not generally known that Judge Packer, of Manch Chunk, is making preparations to ence a Cheese Factory on his property in Springville, in which it is intended to commence operations on the first of May next. The business of making cheese in Factories is of recent origin, but the ancess of the system has been so great, that, at the convention of Cheese Manufacturers in Western New-York, held at Rome, on the 6th of January, 1864, representatives were present from 69 Factories, located in 13 counties, who reported from 15: to 1000 cows each, the whole number being 34,752 cows. It is believed that a better quality of cheese can generally be made at the Factory than in families, that it is quite as fine as the best, and therefore above the average of that manufactured in small parcels. The Superintendent makes it his business to see that all parts of the work are properly performed. His interest and reputation are at stake, prompting him at all times to do his peat; He knows that neglect or mistakes will not be tolerated, and the desire to satisfy persons interested, in order to secure their patronage, stimulates him to make every exertion to build up and sustain a reputation for a superior article. He has every convenience at hand for manufacturing to advantage, and makes the business a specialty and sole employment. In the cheese manufacture under this system, a high degree of skill is expected, and jealous and interested eyes are daily watching and noting every mistake. Uniformity and fine quality are therefore likely to obtain, and whatever progress can be made towards improvement, will naturally develope itself more rapidly here, than among persons scattered over a broad extent of country, and who are occupied with a variety of work so as to have little time to spend in the improvement of any one particular branch.—Factories have acquired a h

credited to the owner, who receives the avails in proportion to the quantity supplied, after deducting the extens of manufacturing, say 14 cents per lb., and some incidental expenses for rennet, bandages, &c.

The Springville Factory consists of two buildings, the manufacturing house, and the curing house; the former bring 44 feet long, and 26 feet wide; and the latter, 84 feet long and 26 feet wide. The capacity is 107 500 cows, but probably not more than the milk of 250 to 300 will be supplied the ensuing season. When it is seen that the Factory is an advantage to the community it will be the precursor of many others in this County. And I would call the attention of the farmers, more particularly in the neighborhood, to this interesting subject. For singular as it may appear, it is built, and mainly intended for their benefit as well as to introduce a new article of trade into this County, which is so well cle of trade into this County, which is seo well adapted for the purpose; as it is well understood that the liberal proprietor has no other end in view and could apply his resources to a much greater pecuniary advantage elsewhere.

SAWING WOOD WITH HORSE POWER.—A Subscriber in Darlington, Pa., writes: "I saw my fire wood with a circular saw, driven by a two-horse rail-way power, and I find it such an advantage that I never intend to saw any more by hand. It pleases the women very much to have plenty of seasoned wood, particularly when baking buckwhent cakes." We are acquainted with a young man in Cayuga Co., N. Y., who was accustomed to do all his threshing with a fiail, and sawing wood by hand. At our suggestion, he purchased a two-horse threshing machine and wood saw. When he performed all this work by hand, he was obliged to work very hard all winter. Now he does his own threshing and wood sawing, and threshes for some of his neighbors. He sawed over 300 cords of wood for them during the past year, besides doing all his own work. He finds much more time to rest and read, and not half the amount of hard labor that was required when he threshed and sawed by hand. He saws, usually, three cords of hard wood, twice in two, pet hour, running time, This practice of making the horses do the hard work, is worthy of almost universal adoption.—American Agriculturist.

What is an Inch of Rain?—The late weekly return of the British Registrar-General gives
the following interesting information in respect
to rainfall:—"Rain fell in London to the amount
of 0.43 inches, which is equivalent to forty-three
tons of rain per acre. The rainfall during last
week varied from thirty tons per acre, in Elin
burgh, to two hundred and fifty tons per acre, in
Glasgow. An English acre consists of 6,72,640
square inches; and an inch deep of rain on an
acre yields 6272,640 cubic inches of water,
which, at 277,274 cubic inches to the gallon,
makes 22,622-5 gallons; and, as a gallon of distilled water weighs 10 pounds the rainfall on an
acre is 226,225 pounds avoirdupois; but 2,240
pounds are a ton, and consequently an inch
deep of rain weighs 100-093 tons, or nearly 101
tons per acre. For every one hundredth of an
inch a ton of water falls per acre." If any acriculturist were to try the experiment of distributing artitletally that which nature so bountifully supplies, he would soon feel inclined to
"rest and be thankful."

Fence Posts Top End CP.—C. Frovines, Ind, writes: "Some strange ideas prevail here in regard to fence posts. Intelligent farmers tell me that posts will last as long again by being well seasoned before they are set, and the top ends being placed in the ground. And I see all the fences built in that way." He asks, "Will some one explain why?—There is no strong evidence that posts thus set will last longer than it they were set with the top end up. Until the evidence is produced, no reason need be sought why a post will deay sooner when it is placed top end up, than when it is set the other way. To test this, we once set fence posts alternately top up and top down, in the same fence, and there never was any preceptible difference in the time of their decaying.—American Agriculturist.

ANTIDOTE FOR POISON.—Dr. J. Edmonds, a prominent physician, writes as follows to the London Times: I enclose a simple, safe and accessible prescription for the whole range of acid corrosive poisons, which, if promptly used, will almost invariably save life. Mix two ounces of powdered chalk or magnesia, or one ounce of washing soda, with a pint of milk, and swallow it at one draught; then tickle the back of the throat with a feather or finger so as to produce vomiting. Afterward drink freely of milk and water, and repeat the vomiting so as to thoroly wash out the stomach. Any quantity of chalk or magnesia may be taken with safety, but soda in large quantities is injurious. I may add, that the narcotics are excepted. Milk is an antidote for almost all the poisons, and especially if followed by vomiting.

AN EXPERIMENT WITH POTATOES.—Issac Hiess, Long Island, writes as follows: "A neighbor last spring cut out all the eyes but the strongest one, and planted the potatoes in a row, giving them the same chances as others planted in the usual way. When dug, these potatoes, Peach Blows, yielded by weight double the quantity of the same variety growing adjoining them. They were also of larger size. His theory is that one good strong shoot, taking its support from a large potato when it begins to grow, will produce more then when the substance, or lood, is divided among several shoots, or even one shoot with but a small piece of potato to commence its growth with. As this was the fact, will it not be a good plan for others to try the experiment?—American Agriculturist. AN EXPERIMENT WITH POTATOES. - ISSUE


