Agricultural Prospects at the West.

A gentleman who has travelled extensively in the West and Southwest reports that in the States of Illinois, Indiana, and Ohlo fuller crops will be planted this spring that perhaps during any of the past three years. The places of enlisted men are fast being supplied by young persons growing up, and the refugees from the South are very numerous, and will farmish much labor, which they will be obliged to do through necessity rather than inclination. In Kentucky less than an average crop of grain and vegetables will be planted this spring. In the celebrated "Bine Grass" region the decline will probables will be planted this spring. Farmers evince a disposition rather to hire out their lands for a year or two than to plant for themselves, and are more ready to sow grasses than grains. Labor is necessarily "demoralized;" though, perhaps, less so than might have been expected. In some parts farmers and planters offer their late "servants" regular wages.

where the soil is of the first quality and the demand enormous, very little can be produced the ensuing summer, and the supply will have to come chiefly from the North. Men from this section who lease abandoned plantations are apt to turn their attention rather to the raising of cotton than to either food or live stock.—Considerable numbers of cattle from the North will be imported during the spring months, and a beginning be made for future developments. The orders for farm implements are unusually heavy in the Northwest, especially in Indianapolis and Chicago, where reaping and mowing machines, &c., are made in immense quantities, while in cities south of the Ohio river orders have greatly fallen off.

"Struck He"-Use of Keroscne.

LUBRICATOR.—Having considerable machinery to run the past winter by horse power, and knowing of no accessible inbricator that would not grow hard in cold weather. I have been experimenting for the purpose of getting a lubricator that would stand the cold, not gum, be cheap, and accessible to all, and have found the following to answer the purpose very satisfactorily:

Lard oil, three parts, and kerosene one part. The oil should be warm, i. e. about 75' Fahrenheit, when the kerosene is put with it, and they shaken occasionally through the day, when it will be cut and mixed. This compound remains liquid some 50' or 60' colder than the best lard oit. I have used it four or five months on most kinds of wood and iron working shop machinery with better satisfaction than with any sperm oil I have ever found. A larger proportion of kerosene stands cold still better, and a smaller proportion gives more body. The same also works well for the axles of carriages, putting in more or less kerosene, according to the time of more or less kerosene, according to the time o

To Kill Lice on Cattle on Colts.—Melt beef's tallow, and mix one part of the tallow with three parts of kerosene, and rub it on to those parts where the lice "most do congregate," thoroughly, once in about three days, till they have got enough, which will not be long.

Boor Grease.—Six parts tallow, two kerosene, one rosin, and a little lamp black, for fall, and spring use—for summer, less kerosene.

Farming Maxims.

A young Men's Society at Mullinavat, Ireland, include agricultural as well as other subjects in their discussions, and the conclusions adopted at several meetings have been published in concise form. Passing over many with especial reference to the agriculture of the locality, we find the following which are worthy of especial remembrance in all countries where the soil is cultivated.

"9th—That a great loss is sustained by allowing corn to become over-ripe; farmers often let it stand a full week too long, and then have nearly two barrels of the best seed shed per

acre.
"10th—Hay is also allowed to become overripe, and, when cut, not quickly saved; it is generally inferior to good straw, through neglect.
"11th—No bull should be used unless pure-bred, and carefully selected from the best stock; a cross of the Alderney cow is decidedly the best to cross with the short-horn. The progeny will also fatten well, and ultimately become the most profitable cattle by returning to short-horn.

"12th—One of the commonest mistakes made by small farmers is that their land is over-stock-ed, and their cattle under-fed—

"Full stock, half profit;" Half stock, full profit."

CLEAN MILKING.—It is sometimes forgotton that the last gill of milk drawn from the cow's udder is the best part of every milking. Caroful experiments made in England show, (according to a report lately published) that the quality of cream obtained from the last cup taken from most cows exceeds that of the first in proportion of twelve to one. Hence a person who carelessly leaves but a half pint of milk undrawn loses in resilty shout as much cream as would be afforded by six or eight pints at the beginning; and loses too that part of the cream which gives the richness and flavor to the butter.

Eogs von Setting.—The following may be of service to those who would have a chicken for every egg they set: Take eggs not more than three or four days old, and have a candle or lamp; hold the egg in one hand with the broad end upwards close to the candle; place the edge of the other hand on the top of the egg, and you will immediately perceive the incubation end. Some people can tell a pullet from a rooster. The mark for a rooster is crosswise, and a pullet lengthwise. Another way is to place your tongue on the large end of the egg, and you will find a strong heat if fresh and good, and less heat if old and doubtful. Eggs put up for hatching should never be put in a damp cellar, as the dampness destroys the heat.

Boxes for Poultry.—Fasten pieces of wide boards on three sides of a hard stone, and with a hammer break the bones from the kitchen in small fragments, not larger than peas. Hens that are laying will eat them with avoidiy.—Bones from fresh meat, if broken fine so that hens will swallow the pieces, are excellent to make them lay. Poultry of all kinds should be well-supplied with sharp gravel also at this season of the year. Pounded oyeier shells, where they can be obtained, afford one of the best means of supplying lime.

There are few of us who appreciate the full advantage of getting a good crop. Like the mind, land will be occupied with something.—An idle brain is the Devil's workshop, and half-cultivated land is soon filled with weeds. Raise a good smothering crop of grain or peas, and you will feel the advantage of it for years. The crop itself pays a handsome profit, the land is cleaner, and the straw will enable you to keep more stock and make more manure.
