Let Them Be drrested.—It will be seen by the following extract from the charge of Judge Pearson to the Grand Jury of Dauphin county, Pa., that he lioids it to be the duty of peace officer to cause the arrest of all persons who express their approbation of the murder of President Lincoln. We hope such a course will be taken throughout Susquehanna county:

"This blow which killed the President was not only struck at the head of the intion, but at the principles of our Government, and liberty itself. Hitherto our public functionaries, from the highest to the lowest, were looked upon as perfectly secure in their persons, so that every citizen could approach them freely and without restraint. Hereafter their satety will require them to be surrounded with guards and ushers; and the people, however urgent their business, if unknown, will be kept at a distance.

"If has been but too common within the last few weeks, and especially since the assassination of the President, for loyal cirizens to resort to violence against those who use language infinical to the Government or approbatory of this cruel murder. Such persons should remember that they are themselves actting an example of lawless violence. The law is strong enough to vindicate itself, and therefore their interference is without justification or excuse. While we deprecate any intermeddling by the military authorities with the cirizens for offences of a merely civil character, we are by no means surprised that their indignation should occasionally be aroused by the use of language which they considered could only be punished through means of the guard-house; and therefore it was resorted to, and the ribadd tongue thereby silenced. Such a course on the part of the military is both unlawful and unnecessary. It may be thought by some that in this country, where freedom of speech is secured by the Constitution, that mere words cannot be punished. Such is a great mistake. Addressor encouragement to crime can never be tolerated in any land of peace and law. Approbation of crime is incouragement, whether it be treason, murder or any test offeree. Therefore persons, during the time of civil war, may be held to their good behavior who utter words of hostility to the Government, or a pprove of the course of its enemies."
