The Caterpiliar Pest.

"We wish there were a law fixing a penalty upon any person upon whose premises a dozen nests could be found in the month of July, and that it was made imperative upon the constable or assessor of every town to see that the law was emforced! Every farmer knows that the destruction caused by caterpillars is a serious annoyance and evil to the community, and yet there are some—alas, too many—who take little or no pains to do their duty in this particular. It is a mistake to say that they have no time to destroy them. They have all the time there is for any of us, and they cannot afferd to incur the cost of raising trees and them suffer them to die before their time, through the agency of caterpillars. This thing ought to be a matter of duty and conscience. Some persons complain of the encroachments of a neighbor's dogs or cattle, and very justly, too, perhaps, while they allow their apple or wild cherry trees to be covered with caterpillars enough to destroy half the orchards in the land!! Consistency is a jewel.—We suggest to such a story about a mote and a beam in the eye."

 $\Lambda$  corresponent of the same paper says: "Why do not the horticulturists insist upon the passage of a law obliging every land owner to extirpate from the fruit and other trees growing upon his land that most intolerable pest, the caterpillar? Last year none were allowed to mature upon my trees, and yet I have this year destroyed over 500 nests. This evening a stroll of a mile around the outskirts of the city revealed the origin of these pasts upon my trees. vealed the origin of these pests upon my trees.

Each of these webs contain about three hundred worms. ## A Word to Farmers.

The last report of the Commissioners of Agriculture is particularly interesting at this moment, when the downfail of the so-called Confederacy, and the capture of its President, has prepared the way for an early peace which will support the Government and the Union forever. The point which is of as much moment as almost any is concerning farm stock, now drained by a long war. The decrease of horses, cattle, and swine has been very great. Sheep have increased, numbering 4,300,878, and the wool clip for 1805 is estimated at 114,589,076 pounds. As wool has not reached so great a comparative height as other textiles, its fall is likely to be more gentle, and the cost of byef will render more gentle, and the cost of beef will render mutton valuable and more common. Therefore sheep husbandry holds out great inducements to all our farmers. A very few years will secure a good flock from a small beginning. The proua-bility is, therefore, that it will be largely entered upon at once.

The Commissioner thinks that breadstuffs will upon at once.

The Commissioner thinks that breadstuffs will fall when the army demand is removed. But he is of opinion that there will be an active and growing demand for stock that will sustain, if it does not enhance, current prices. Our exports of butter and cheese increase annually; but the number of cows has fallen off. This must be stopped, or the export fails. Cows should be kept from slaughter. Even with the realization of the promise of great crops of grain, the decrease of hogs win keep their price up. The inducement for their increase is consequently great, and should be regarded.

PREPARATION FOR PRESERVING LEATHER. We translate from the Geber Courier a receip for a preparation which is said to insure great durability to leather, and to make it pliable and soft. It consists of four articles, tallow, soap rosin, and water. These ingredients are prepar-

ed as follows:

Twenty-one parts of tallow are melted in a vessel, three parts of rosin added, and the two, when melted, mixed well together. In another vessel seven parts of good washing soap are desolved, and the mass heated to the boiling point, and add the part prepared before, let boil once more gently, and the preparation is ready for use. It is especially adapted to boots and harnesses.—Shoe and Leather Reporter.

CORNS CURED .- Half's Journal of Healthgood authority—gives us this mode:

The safest, the most accessible, and the most efficient cure of a corn on the toe, is to double a piece of thick, soft buckskin, cut a hole in it large enough to receive the corn, and bind it around the toe. If, in addition to this, the foot is soaked in warm water for five or more minutes every morning and night, and a few drops of sweet oil or other oily substance are patiently rubbed in on the end after the soaking, the corn will almost infallibly become loose enough in a few drays to be easily pricked out with a finger nail; this saves the necessity of paring the corn, which operation has sometimes been followed with painful and daugerous symptoms.—If the corn becomes inconvenient again, repeat the process at once. good authority-gives us this mode:

CHINESE TREATMENT OF ANIMALS.—They never punish; hence a mule that, in the hands of a foreigner, would be not only useless but dangerous to every one about it, becomes in the possession of a Chinaman as quiet as a lamb and as tractable as a dog. We never beheld a runaway, a jibbing or a vicious mule or pony in Chinaman's employment; but found the same rattling cheerful pace maintained over heavy or light ground by means of a turn-t or cluck-k, the beast turning to the right or left, and stopping with but a hint from the reina. This treatment is extended to all the animals they press into their service. Often have I admired the tact exhibited in getting a large drove of frightened sheep through narrow crowded streets and alleys, by merely having a little boy to lead one of the quietest of the flock in front; the others steadily followed without the aid either of a yelping cur or a cruel goad. Cattle, pigs, and birds are equally cared for.—Tracels on Horseback in Mantchu Tartary.

FEEDING RYE TO MARIES.—Mesers. Tucker:In reply to W. R., in the Country Gentleman of In reply to W. R., in the Country Gentleman of May 4th, with regard to mares not getting with foal when fed on rye, I would say that it depends altogether upon how much ergot there is in rye; but as there is always more or less in all, I would recommend not using any as food for brood-mares. Ergot is an echolic or parturient, and is sometimes used during the act of parturition to increase the uterine contraction and expedite the expulsion of the feetus. It is a disease of rye that occurs about the time of blooming, when the young seed is observed to be covered with a white powdered matter, the seeds of a fungua, which gives the grain a mildewed appearance, arrests its natural growth, and causes its abortion. This aborted embryo gradually increases in size, passes out beyond the hust, becomes more and more deformed, acquires a purple or brown color, and forms the ergot or spur. Sometimes only a few grains in a head are affected, and sometimes scarcely one being altogether sound. J. C. Histories, V. S. Kingston, N. J.


