Cows Leaking Milk.

The family cow will not unfrequently come home at night from the rich pasture with milk streaming from one or more tests. This is particularly the case with easy milkers. Having such a cow, and not fancying the loss of a quart or two each day, we applied collodion (liquid cuticle, obtained at the druggista) to the end of the test, which effected a perfect cure. The protection retained the milk, but gave way to a firm pressure of the test with the hand. In this case a single application sufficed, but great milkers may need two or three coatings, at intervals, before the orifice is sufficiently closed.—Tribune.






