State Tares.—The following section of the Act of April 30th, 1864, changes the law in regard to the of April 30th, 1864, changes the law in regard to the jument of State Taxes:

That so much of the forty-second section of the complete states are supproved the twenty-ninth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and forty-four, as provides for the abatement of five per centum on the amount of State taxes, paid fifteen days prior to the first of September, in any year, may be and is hereby rejudied, and, hereafter, it shall be the duty of the Auditor General to add five per centum penalty to each county, on all State taxes remaining unpaid on the best day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sitty-live, and of each year thereafter, which shall be charged in the duplicate, against each delinquent tax-payer in arrears, on and after the said day.

Robbing a Soldter.—The horde of thieves that beset the returning soldiers at all points, was represented in Binghamton. In the counterfeit the "th" and the ornamental lines above run into and touch the border; in the genuine there is a clear space between. On the right end of back of note there are fourteen small ovals; on the edge of each oval the figures in the lad read 160, or inverted, while on the left they are 100.—This is the roverse of those figures in the genuine; there, it will be seen, that on the right hand they read 100, and on the left 100. Mr. Editor Republican: — You will very much oblige the inquiring Public by giving, through your columns, the facts in relation to the "increase of pay," granted by your last Legislature, to Judges, Sheriffs, Prothonotaries, and so down. Friend Frazier: This time it is "Headquarters" at home. Company "B," of the 143 Eert Pa. Vol., has been scattered to the winds and remains no more an organization. The Company was organized August 22d, 1862, and mustered into the U. B. service Aug. 26th, 1862. It was originally commanded by Capt. J. H. Bornborger, who resigned Feb. 1st, 1863. He was succeeded by Capt. W. G. Graham, who resigned Oct. 26th, 1865. J. M. Lingtelter, tormerly first Sergeant, after wards promoted to second and first Lieutenaut, was made Captain of the Company Feb. 28th, 1864, and cominmed in command till its muster out of service—making a gallant and efficient officer. The following written address was presented to him on the disbanding of the Company, June 19th, 1865, signed by every member of the same:

We, the undersigned, members of Company B, 1836 Regt. Pa. Vola., do hereby present to Capt. J.

M. Lingrielter our Company Flag, as a token of our esteem for him as a gentleman and a soldier, and for the kindness exhibited toward us through the many hardships of a soldier's life for the period of nearly three years. We also desire to express to the Captain our sincere thanks for the manner in which he has always conducted the Company affairs since taking command of the same.

Pollock's Hill, Chancellorsville, Gettyshurg, Haymarket, Eapldan, Wilderness, Laurel Hill, Spotsylvania, North Anna, Bethesda Church, Chickahominy, Petersburg, Weldon R. R., Peebles Farm, Hatcher's Run, Weldon R. R. 2d, Hatcher's Run 2d.

The Company was mustered out of service June 12th, and paid off June 19th, 1865, at Harrisburg, Pa. Since the organization of the Company there has been in it in all 183 men—85 being recruits who joined in 1863 and '04; 74 men were present at muster out; thus showing a loss of 109 men by death, transfer, &c.

Many of our numbers we left behind, slumbering in Southern soil. Brave boys they were. To the friends of such we offer our heart-felt sympathies, and assure them that their loved ones fell willing eacrifices upon their county's slar and while nobly discharging their duty, and that they will ever be held in grateful remembrance by, those with whom they fought side by side. May Peace be restored to all parts of our ones distracted Country, and our gallant old Flag be loved and recognized by all.


