Gratitude for the luxuriant harvests that whitened the fields and sweetened toil, for there is nothing better than success to cheer the hearts of all faithful efforts to succeed; and the growing crops of corn, cats, flax, and potatoes every where added their testimony to prove the skill of the farmer and show the goodness of the Lord; and wonder at the progress and improvement manifested all along the way since first I traversed it, three years ago, and amid war and sommotion, too.

At New-Laceyville the "oil fever" has somewhat affected the people, splendid visions float in their future, and fabulous fortunes beckon the adventurious on to appropriation "Excelsion." 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


