us the twool on.—The following receipt is given for tanning sheep skins with the wool on:

"Take one tablespoonful of alum and two of salver: pulverize well and mix together thoroughly, sprinkle this powder on the fiesh side of the skin and fold together/with the wool out; hang up in cool place. In two or three days, as soon as dry, take down, scrape the flesh side with a blunt edged knite till clean." This completes the process.—Sach skins make excellent saddle covers.

\*\*Representation of Pennsylvania, in 1835, are reported by the Agricultural Bureau, to compare favorably with those of 1864. Distractised.—As the fall elections will soon be coming on, it should be borne in mind that by situe of the proclamation of the President, of March 10th, issued in conformity to a law of Congress, dated March 3d, 1865, all persons duly enrolled who departed from the jurisdiction of the districts in which they were enrolled, or went beyond the limits of the United States to avoid the drait, or described from the army or navy, are prohibited from exercising the elective franchise. It will be the duty of the officers to enforce this penalty in all cases at the coming election.

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A complete list for every township in the county should be immediately made out. It is a work alike of political importance and sound justice. Let the law be strictly enforced.

How to Compute the Faconse Tax.—Since the publication of the income tax list there has been considerable discussion as to the rate of taxation and the amount of the incomes of those whose names appear in the list. Some persons who have not read the law, suppose that five per cent, is the rate hassessed upon all incomes, without regard to the amount. This is not correct. The law requires that all incomes over six hundred and not exceeding five thousand dollars, shall be taxed at the rate of five per cent, and the excess over five thousand at the rate of ten per cent. If an individual's income be five thousand dollars per annum, the six hundred dollars exempted by law is deducted, and the remaining forty-four hundred assessed at the rate of five per cent. If the income be ten thousand dollars, the rate will be five per cent, on forty-four hundred, and ten per cent on the remaining five thousand dollars.

She is manned as so follows: One Captain, I Lieutenant of matines, I Mary Lieutenant, 1 Chief Engineer and 5 assistants, 1 Surgeon and 1 assistant Surgeon, 1 Paymasier and 4 clerk, 1 Captain's clerk, 1 Salimaker, 1 Boatswin, 4 Master's, 1 Master's mate, there should be four, 3 Marine sergeants, Coal-heavers, Seamen, Ordinary seamen, Landsmen and boys, and a few Others of different stripes, to make the total number 322 Officers and men."

Mr. EDITON:—I noticed in your last paper, the report of the income returns for this county. The last which is published gives, in the whole county, but twenty-three names. Those who receive a salary from which the deduction is previously made, would add, perhaps, two or three names.

Will you give us in your next, in a parallel column, the population of finsque hanna County? Will you give, also, the form of the oath, by which the return of income is attested? The deposition roquires one to say that the statement which he has given of all his income is field, particular, and correct. There are strong words.

There has been some criticism of the work of collectors and officials. It has been said that they are in a hurry often, and do not care to take the time which a close inquiry requires, or that they are hindered from a full investigation by a common courtery, or that they assume that the person to whom they apply is of such character, that they need not question that his statement is complete and accurate. It might be a dishonor to question such a man as though there were any doubt of his word, or to examine him like a witness before a Police Court, whose only object is to conceal the truth in regard to themselves. But the form of this oath goes lar to acquit them of any neglect. It places the whole responsibility of the return with the man who etands under oath to say that his return is fall true, particular, and correct.

And is there not something in an old book which are accessors used to read, and which we sometimes hear some passages from on Sunday, in regard to testimony, oaths, truth-telling, &c.? That perhaps you may also publish.

But, if they do not, they only represent so many falsedhoods. It is said that there are ways in which the intent of the law is evaded, and deceptive returns are given. But this is not shrewdness or claverness. It is dishonest practice and criminalty. The common talk shows that we are in danger of a loss of all moral sense. It indicates a tendency which will only cease with the overthrow of all personal morality. The mean cheat, the low cumning, the evasive return is followed by a more dangerous public sentiment in which the reality of crime is gone.

There is another form of public criticism, which, however unjust it often may be, is yet here inevitable. When one looks at the way in which people live, and compares it with the return income, which is published, the conclusion is before the whole community. It is this. Men are living so far beyond their income that they are on the ever of inevitable failure and bankruptcy, for their returns of income are false. We can take the alternative.
