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Should Oregon, California, and New Mexico fly off, and the Rocky Mountains be the division between the United States of the Pacific, the Atlantic Union will contain fifty sovereign States; and the Pacific Union nineteen sovereign States.

The calculations are based upon the recent report of the United States Commissioner of the General Land Office—and take into account every State not yet formed into States.
