

SEVEN DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE.

Arrival of the Cambria.

The Steamship Cambria, Capt. Shannon, arrived at Halifax at 3 o'clock this morning. She has 56 through passengers, and brings European news seven days later.

Austria's Parliament is to be prorogued on the 9th. A motion, which Lord Brougham previously announced his intention to make, as reference to the French expedition in Italy, was laid upon the table of peers on Friday.

The cholera is still raging in many parts of the country to a fearful extent. In Liverpool it is rapidly increasing. Ireland, however, continues generally exempt from its ravages.

THE REVOLUTION IN HUNGARY.—A Turkish Ambassador in Paris, received a despatch on the 15th inst., by courier, announcing that the Polish Gen. Bem, had again defeated the Russians under the command of Lours, in Transylvania, and that the latter had been obliged to take refuge in Wallachia, with a small remnant of his army.

Advices from Vienna, of the 15th of July state that Buda and Pesth had surrendered to the Austrian-Russian troops on the 11th inst., without resistance.

From a report of Gen. Haynau, addressed to the Emperor of Austria, it appears that a very sharp conflict took place on the 11th between the Russian and the Hungarian armies and the Magyars. The Hungarians fought with fierce impetuosity, but the Austrians claim the victory.

Another and probably more reliable account of this battle states that the Russian army, which was brought into the field by the Hungarians, and the loss sustained by the latter in artillery-men, may be estimated at the number of 2000.

The President's stand by a small party of police and military, stood up in their defence; and succeeded in forcing their way through the gap, after a short struggle in which 40 or 50 persons are said to have been killed or wounded on both sides.

The missing Montenegro representative has been found in England. The Pope has addressed an autograph letter to the Sultan, on the occasion of receiving the keys of Rome. His Holiness congratulates the General on the triumph of order in Rome, and expresses his hope that Hyvne Providence will continue to bless the efforts of the French army.

The Roman troops who had agreed in the first instance, to do duty conjointly with the French, are all leaving; and the whole force remaining now amounts to less than 10000 men, of those many are anxious to leave, but Gen. Oudinot would not give his consent.

FLORIDA INDIANS.—If the following, from an extra of the Savannah Georgian, be correct, the hopes here entertained, that the late Indian outbreak in Florida was the act of only a few desperate fellows among them, will be fulfilled.

A slip from the Savannah Georgian of July 17th, says that there was further outbreak of the Indians at Charlotte's Harbor on the Gulf, nearly simultaneous, with that on Indian River. These outbreaks were nearly simultaneous, that the express from early place met the other at Tampa.

Fifteen Indians went into Mr. Kennedy's store at Charlotte's Harbor. Mr. K. being absent, the Indians killed his clerk and another man, besides wounding several other men and several women, plundering the store, and finally burning it.

Two military companies which were sent from Tampa to protect the frontier, almost entirely deserted. It is said that the Indians are contemplating another desperate war. Great alarm prevails among the planters, and they are arming themselves with arms and horses for safety.

Further information was received on Wednesday, in Savannah, of Indian outbreaks in Florida. They attacked some settlements near Tampa Bay and Charlotte Harbor, murdering six or seven persons. They pursued a flight on a stream, on the opposite banks of which 100 warriors appeared, shouting the war-whoop, and during the flight, they retreated. The plantations along the coast, from the Gulf to the Gulf, have been placed under military discipline.
