Right of the boundary, thereby probably doubling at once the entire present value of property in Canada, whilst, by giving stability to our institutions, and introducing prosperity, it would raise our public credit to an equality with the United States and foreign countries whilst it would not necessarily diminish to any great extent our intercourse with Great Britain, into which our products would, for the most part, enter on the same routes and canal highway as the immigration to, and exports from the West, to the incalculable benefit of our country. It would also include manufacturing into Canada as rapidly as they have been introduced into the United States; and to Lower Canada especially where water privileges and labor are abundant and cheap, it would attract manufacturing capital, enhancing the value of agricultural produce, and giving remunerative employment to what is at present a comparatively non-productive population. Nor would the United States thereby furnish the capital for our manufacturing establishments.
