Those of the gooseberry and current should have all the eyes removed, except three or four at the top, as by this means they will produce on single stalks and throw up no suckers. Grape cuttings should be lanted two eyes out, and all cuttings should be partially shaded or they will not take root with certainty. This is particularly true with the grape.

Currents, goosebries, and grapes, two years from the cuttings should now be transplanted in place, and in putting them out be sure not only to dig the holes as large as you intend the roots to expand, but also to a depth of at least two feet, filling up the space previously occupied by the sub-soil He that dies a martyr proves that he i with good earth.
