

From these fundamental facts the reflecting dairy man will derive many important practical rules. Some of these two shall enumerate and leave the rest to be discovered. Cows should be milked as near the dairy as possible in order to prevent the necessity of carrying and cooling the milk before it is put into the cream dishes.

Every cow's milk should be kept separate (all the peculiar properties of each are so well known as to admit of their being classified, when those that are most nearly allied may be mixed together. When it is of a very fine quality, it should be entirely the milk of these cows who yield a cream of a bad quality, and also keep the milk that is first drawn from the cow at each milking entirely separate from that which is afterwards obtained, as the quality of the latter is most otherwise be decreased, without materially augmenting its quantity. For the same purpose, take only the cream that is first separated from the drawn milk.

**Agriculture.**  
Here are some wholesome suggestions in regard to milking and the management of a milk in a dairy, which we condense from an English work on the subject: The operation of milking should be performed gently not harshly. If harshly performed it becomes painful to the cow, who not infrequently brings into her udder a quantity of her milk at pleasure. When gently performed, milking generally gives pleasure to the cow. Many instances are recorded where cows who would not let down a single drop of milk to one dairy man, would let it flow in abundance whenever another approached them.

Cows that are ticklish or skittish should always be treated with the utmost gentleness, and when the udder is hard and painful, it should be tenderly formed with lukewarm water, and softly rubbed. Such treatment will bring the cow into good temper, and induce her to yield her milk freely. Whenever a cow's teats become scratched or wounded, so as to produce fowl milk such milk should on no account be mixed with the sweet milk, but to be given to the pig with, but being carried into the milk house, let its presence should taint the atmosphere, and prove injurious to the other milk. It is well to comb and curd cows, as it promotes cleanliness. The fact is, where clean milk is an object, the comb and brush together with a thorough washing of the udder are indispensable. Of the milk of one cow at any time that part which comes off the first is always thinner and of a much worse quality for making butter than afterwards obtained - and this richness continues to increase progressively to the very last drop that can be obtained. 2. If milk be put in a dish and allowed to stand till it throws up cream, the portions of cream rising at first to the surface is richer in quality and greater in quantity, than that which rises in the second equal space of time, and that which rises in the second equal space of time is greater in quantity and better in quality, than that which rises in the third space of time, and so of the rest; the cream that rises in the fourth, and so of the rest; the cream that rises in quantity, and to decline in quality, so long as any rises to the surface. 3. Thick milk throws up a smaller portion of the cream which it usually contains than milk that is thinner; but the cream of a richer quality - if water be added to that thick milk it will afford a considerably greater quantity of cream, and consequently more butter, than it would have done if allowed to remain pure; but its quality is at the same time greatly debased.
