We could never see clearly the necessity or the propriety of interfering in the election of a Governor, the discussion of questions upon which he could never be called to act in his executive capacity.

As a general rule, our State governments, and the questions arising in their administration, are distinct and dissimilar from those arising in the administration of the general actor belonging only to the latter, and when brought to influence the result of a State canvass, are generally illegitimate and out of place.

There are other reasons in the principles and details of this Bill, as for instance "the Clayton Amendment," in reference to naturalized citizens, why Governor Bigler in our opinion cannot support it, but our article is already quite too long and we forbear.

The Nebraska-Kansas Bill now before Congress is eminently a national issue. So far as our pending State canvass is concerned, it has no natural or legitimate connection with it, and we have regretted to see a disposition manifested to force it upon us.

"The Constitution and Laws of the United States which are not locally inapplicable shall have the same force and effect within the said Territory of Nebraska as elsewhere within the United States; except the eighth section of the act preparatory to the admission of Missouri into the Union approved March sixth eighteen hundred and twenty, which, being inconsistent with the principles of non-intervention by Congress with slavery in the States and Territories as recognized by the Legislature of 1850, commonly called the Compromise Measure is hereby declared inoperative and void."
