That it shall be the duty of the commissioners of each county, to ascertain triennially with the assistance of the respective assessors, the exact number of taxable citizens residing in each school district in their several counties, and to certify the same under their hands and seals of office to the Superintendent of Common Schools, who is hereby directed to adopt the number of taxables thus certifyed to him, as the basis of distribution of the State appropriation, which said certificates shall be prepared and transmitted on or before the first Monday of June in every third year, commencing with the first Monday of June Anno Domini, one thousand eight hendred and fifty-four; and if the commissioners of any county shall neglect to forward such certificates on or before said day; the superintesident may in such case, adopt the number of taxables set

forth in the next preceeding certificate or return. SEC. 48.
