RESOLUTION PROPOSING Amendments to the Constitution of the Commonwealth.

Section 1. Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendments be and the same are heroby proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, under and in accordance with the provis-ions of the tenth article thereof, to wit PROPOSITION 1. TO BE ARTICLE XI.

Section 1. The aggregate amount of debts hereafter contracted by the Commonwealth shall. never exceed the sum of five hundred thousand dollars, except in case of war to repel invasion suppress insurrection, or to redeem the public debt of the Commonwealth, and the money so raised shall be applied to the purpose for which the debt may be contracted, or pay such debts,
