They find that by section 5th of the General Election Law, "if er corrupt means or device whatsoever, either directly or indirectly, attempt to influence any elector of this State, in giving his vote or ballot, or deter him from giving the same, or disturb or hinder him in the free exercise of the right of suffrag at any election within this State, held pursuant to this chapter, and shall thereof be convicted, such person so offine in no case to exceed five hundred dollars. nor such imprisonment one year."


