WAR DEPARTMENT OF RE-PUBLIC OF NICARAGUA. GRANADA; June 1, 1855, Sin: His Supreme Excellency has been pleased to issue the following decree: The Deputy-President of the Republic of

Nicaragua to the inhabitants: Having positive information that the adventurers, Kinney and Fabens, are preparing ted States of North America against this republic, with a view of taking possession of a portion of its territory under false pretenes, and being advised that said expedition intends to attack and destroy the independence of the nation, all Nicaraguans are bound to rush to its defence, and it is a sagred duty of the government to adopt efficient measures for preserving the territorial integnity of the republic, and saving its sovereignity and liberty. Therefore, in the exercise of

its power it decrees:
Art. 1. All able-bodied Nicaraguans are numoned to take un arms and defend the ndependence of the country against the piratical foreign invasion which threatens it. Art. 2. Wherefore, from the publication of this decree, they will be ready to serve put themselves at the disposal of the military chief at the proper point, at the first signal of
