

Willsburg for Buchanan.

Without any exceptions every county in the State so far has declared in favor of the "Old Buck" for the Presidency. Allegany county held her Democratic Convention, and passed unanimous resolutions in his favor. It now appears very evident that the next State Convention will be for the great statesman of the present age. The following are the resolutions of the county.
