Potatoe Crop in Ireland. The Belfast Daily Mercury, of December 1st, has the following account of the pototoe crop in Ireland ;

"The potatoe crop is at length raised, and its abundant produce has been stored up in excellent condition. Some of the newer varicties of the Irish esculent have turned out far beyond the ordinary amount of yield, and even the older and what may be called more finished qualities, gave very ample produce. In several districts in this country the gross amount of yield has been nearly two hundred and fifty bushels per acre, on other lands two hundred bushels were raised, and the less active soils produced about one hundred and fifty bushels. In very few instances have traces of the disease been found, and even where that malady had caught on some portion of the crop, the tubers so attacked are still fit for cattle-feeding, thus, in a great degree, making up for the loss that might otherwise have been sustained. The extent of soil under patatoes in Ireland, this season, is given at nine hundred and eighty-one thousand five hundred and twenty-nine acres. The value of this crop is estimated by the Mercury at 1s, 8d, per bushel, giving to the entire crop a money value equal to twelve diseased, or the otherwise inferior portions of yield is said to be very fine.

Instruction in Agriculture.

The extent of our country and the cheapness of land, together with the sparseness of our population, have operated to delay the establishment in the United States of Agricultural Colleges and Schools; while in the densely populated countries of Europe—especially in Prussia—these institutions are very numerous and well-sustained. It is said that in this monarchy alone there are now five Agricultural Colleges, and a sixth is about to be opened, where are taught by both theory and practice, the highest branches of science connected with the culture and improvement of the soil; of Agricultural Schools of a more elementary order, there are ten; there are also seven schools devoted to instruction in the culture of flax: two especially devoted to instruction in the management of mendow lands; one for instruction in the management of sheep; and there are also forty-five model farms, intended to serve in introducing better modes of agriculture; in all, seventy-one public establishments for agricultural education, not to mention others of a kindred nature, or those private schools where the art and science of good farming

In Pennsylvania we have not yet one similar institution—no, not even in the whole United States! We are as far in the rear of Prussia, in her agricultural institutions, as we are in advance of her in our political institutions. Freedom as we understand it, should be universal, so should a theoretical and practical knowledge of Agriculture, which is the great business of the world, and without it all others would soon perish.
