FACTS ABOUT MILK.- Cream cannot rise through a great depth of milk. If, therefore, milk is desired to retain its cream for a time, it should be put into a deep, narrow dish; but if it be desired to free it most completely of cream, it should be poured into a broad, flat dish, not much exceeding one inch in depth. The evolution of cream is facilitated by a rise, and retarded by a depression of temperature. At the usual temperature of the dairy-fifty degrees of Fahrenheit-all the cream will probably rise in thirty-six hours; but at seventy degrees it will perhaps rise in half that time; and when the milk is kept near the freezing point, the cream will rise very slowly, because it becomes solidified In wet and cold weather the milk is less rich than in dry and warm, and on this account more cheese is obtained in cold than in warm, though not in thundery weather. The season has its effects. The milk, in spring, is supposed to be the best for drinking; hence it would be the best for calves ; in summer if is best suited for cheese; and in autumn the butter for keeping is better than that of sninmer-the cows loss frequently milked, give richer milk, and consequently more butter. The morning's milk is richer than the evening's. The last drawn milk of each milking, at all times and sensons, is richar than the first drawn, which is the poorost .- Western Agriculturist.

A VALUABLE PAINT. Take common clay, the same that common bricks are made of dry, pulverize, and run through a sieve, and mix with linseed oil. You have then, a first rate fire-proof paint, of a delicate drab color. Put it on as thick as may be practicable.

If any one has any doubts on the subject let him try it on a small scale-paint a shingle for instance, and let it dry. Recollect that it must be mixed thicker than common paint

The clay will, when first dug, be wet or damp, but will soon dry, spread in the air, under shelter, or if wanted immediately, it may be dried in a kettle over the fire. When dry it will be in lumps, &c., and can be pulverized by placing in an iron kettle set a few inches in the ground, and pounding it with a billet of hard wood three inches in diameter, three feet long, the lower end rounded off a little, &c. Then sift. Any clay will make paint, but the colors may differ, which can easily be ascertained by trying it on a small scale as above indicated. By burning the clay slightly, you get a light red, and the greater the heat you subject them to, the brighter of desper the red.-- Country Gent.

POULTRY AND THEIR DUNG .- To promote the laying of your hers in winter, feed them Twice a day with grain, alternately between corn. oats, and buck wheat-two or three times a week, give them messes of fresh meat or fresh fish, chopt very fine. Keep under cover, always accessable to them, old mortar, chalk broke fine, or lime that has been slacked-oyster-shell lime is best-or bones finely pulverized-also, sand and ashes for the hens to dust themselves in. Water them three times a day. Clear out your poultry house three times a week, put the dung in a barrel, cover it with a slight covering of earth, and sprinkling of plaster-keep the barrel in a dry place, and every five barrels of hen dung thus preserved will be sufficient manure to grow you fifty
