And when they have been in fault, it is not to punish them simply on account of the personal injury, that you have chanced to suffer in consequence of their fault; while disobediance, unattended by inconvenience to yourself, passes without rebuke.

Nor is it to overwhelm the little culprit. with a flood of angry words, to ston him with a deafening noise; to call him by hard names, which do not express his misdeeds; to load him with epithets, which would be extravagant if applied to a fault of ten fold enormity; or to decide, with passionate velicinence, that he is the worst child in the village and destined to the gallows.

But it is to watch anxiously for the first rising of sin, and to repress them; to counteract the earliest workings of selfishness, to teach an implicit and unquationing obedience to the will of the parent, as the best preparation for a future, allegiance to the acquirements of a civil magistrate, and to the laws of Heaven.

It is to punish a fault ; because it is a fault, because it is sinful and contrary to the commands of God, without reference to whether it may or not have been productive to immediate injury to the parent.

It is to reprove with calmness and composure and not with augry irritation; in a few words, fifly chosen, and not with a torrent of abuse; to punish as often as you threaten, and threaten only when you intend and can remember to preform; to say what you mean, and infalibly to do as you say.

It is to govern your family as in the sight of Him, who gave you your authority : who will reward your strict fidelity with such blessings as he has bestowed on Abraham, or punish your neglect with such curses as he visited on Eli.

## Religion and Business.

An individual, upon being reproached for ome dishonorable transaction in business, as inconsistent with religion, replied, "What has religion to do with business? The answer lemonstrated either his ignorance, or wacked. acis, or both. But, if we may judge from their conduct, this is the sentiment of many professors, although, perhaps, they would not avow it. Are they not acting as if religion had nothing to do either with business, with temper, or with our domestic or social relutions ?-as if it were a matter of opinion, devotion, or ceremony - a thing of the cloister, or closet or sanctuary, which is to be confined to its own retreats, and never to be allowed to approach, the scenes of worldly business and secular pursuits-a rule to direct us how to conduct ourselves in the house of God, and to regulate our worship; and which, having

My friend, religion has to do with business, whether you admit it or not, and if your religion does not go with you to your business or daily labor, you may conclude that it is not a proper kind of religion.
