SUSQUEHANNA COUNTY NORMAL SCHOOL.

Prof. J. F. Stoddard, Principal. THE SUSQUEHANNA COUNTY NORMAL SCHOOL was opened on Monday, the 30th day of November, 1857, to continue two quarters of 11 weeks each, under the charge of Prof. STODDARD and competent Assistants. The first quarter will close on the 20th of February next. The second quarter will commence on the 1st day of FEBRUARY, 1858. During the most of this quarter, P. F. Tewksbury, Co. Supt., will be present to aid in preparing teachers for the discharge of their arduous duties. Those who design becoming teachers should not fail to avail themselves of the advantages here presented. Prof. Stoddard will deliver, during the term, a Course of Lectures on the Science and Art of Teaching, and Moral Development.
