If those who swallow Greeley's false statement would read both ordinances. or the tematks of Mr. English, they would see that this has as little truth in it as many other things found in that incendiary sheet. For the benefit of those who wish to understand the matter, we publish below, the original Lecompton ordinance. Read and compare it with that of Mr. English, in another columa :

ORDINANCE.

Whereas. The Government of the United State is the proprietor, or will become so, of all or most of the lands lying within the limits of Kansas, as determined under this Constitution; and Whereas, The State of Kansas will possess the undoubted right to tax such lands for the support of her State Government, or for other proper and lightimate pur-poses connected with her existence as a State : Now, therefore, be it ordnined by this Couvention; on behalf of and by the authority c the people of Kansas, that the right aforesaid to tax such lands shall be and is hereby forever reliaquished, if the conditions following shall be accepted and agreed-to by the Cougress of the United States :

Sec. 1. That sections numbered eight, sixteen, twenty-four and thirty-six, in every township in the State, or in case either of said numbered sections are or shall be otherwise disposed of, that other lands, equal thereto in value, and as contiguous as may be, shall be granted to the State, to be applied exclusively to the support of common schools.

Sec. 2. That all salt spring-, and gold, silyer, copper, lead or other valuable mines, to gether with the land necessary for their full occupation and use, shall be granted to said State for the use and benefit of said State; and the same shall be used or, disposed of under such terms and conditions and regulations as the Legislature of said State shall direct

Sec. 3. That five per centum of the pro ceeds of the sale of all public lands sold, or held in trust, or otherwise, lying within the said State, whether sold before or after the ad mission of the State into the Union, after de ducting all expenses incidental to the same, Barrel Salt, shall be paid to the said State.

Sec. 4. That seventy two sections, or two entire townships, shall be designated by the President of the United States, which shall be reserved for the use of a seminary of learn ing, and appropriated by the Legislature of said State solely to the use of said Seminary. Sec 5. That each alternate section of land how owned, or which may hereafter be acquired by the United States; for twelve miles on each side of a line of railroad to be established or located from some point on a northern boundary of the State; leading southerly through said State in the direction of the Gulf of Mexico, and on each side of a line of railroad to be located and established from some point on the Missouri river westwardly tbrough said State in the direction of the Pa cific Ocean, shall be reserved and conveyed to said Siste of Kausas, for the purpose of siding in the construction of said railroad. And it shall be the duty of the Congress of the United States, in conjunction with the proper authorities of this State, to adopt immediate

article, that a company may be enrolled and or-ganized without an uniform, provided it be obtained previous to inspection; so all that is necessary to organ ze a military Volunteer Company under this act is to have thirty two members, rank and file.]

COMMUTATIONS. Art. 2d. The sum of one dollar, in rural districts, and one dollar and fifty cents if in cities, against every person who is liable to do military duty, shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner that taxes are collected ; ex-

cept when the person so assessed, is between the ages of eighteen and twenty-one, in which case the Collector shall collect the said fine or tax of the father, master or guardian, or out of any property such minor may have.

FURNISHING ARMS. The Adjutant General shall furnish, on the order of the commander-in-chief, or the requisition of the brigade inspector, all necessary arms and equipments for all the officers of the State.

There shall be paid for service rendered in privance of this act, to all officers, musicians and privates of any uniformed company, owe dollar and fifty cents for every day of actual daty, and for each horse used by them, one dol-
