

Objections to the Kansas Bill.
The three leading objections urged by the opponents of the administration to the Kansas bill, which has recently become a law, are, that the preamble recognizes the legality of the Leocompton Constitution—that it does not secure to the people the right to accept or reject the constitution by their vote; that it constitutes the offer of a bribe in the shape of an immense grant of government lands for educational, benevolent and other purposes, as a condition of their acceptance of the proposition submitted to them.

As to the first objection we dispose of that in the first objection we dispose of that the Crittenden Amendment, which received the support of the entire Republican party, contained the same recognition of the Leocompton Constitution, and in precisely the same words, as the conference bill, as follows to wit:—

"Whereas the people of the Territory of Kansas did, by a convention of delegates assembled at Leocompton, on the 7th day of November, 1857, for that purpose, form for themselves a constitution and State Government."

This provision having been quoted verbatim by the Conference Committee, from the bill previously voted for by the Republicans, we submit that they are forever estopped from making an objection to the measure finally agreed upon and enacted into a law by a democratic Congress and a democratic administration.

Objection number two is that it does not submit the Leocompton Constitution to the people.

The first section of the bill, as it passed the Senate, is as follows:—

"That the State of Kansas be, and is hereby admitted to the Union on an equal footing with the original States, in all respects whatsoever; but upon the fundamental condition, namely, THAT THE QUESTION OF ADMISSION, WITH THE FOLLOWING PROVISIONS, IN lieu of the ordinance framed at Leocompton, BE SUBMITTED TO THE VOICE OF THE PEOPLE OF KANSAS, AND assented to by them, or a majority of the voters voting at the election to be held for that purpose."

And the same section further provides that—

"As said election the voting shall be by ballot, and by endorsing on his ballot, as each voter may please, 'proposition accepted' or 'proposition rejected.' Should the majority of votes be cast for 'proposition accepted,' the President of the United States, as soon as the fact is duly made known to him, shall thereupon, without any further proceedings on the part of Congress, the admission of Kansas into the Union on an equal footing with the original States, in all respects whatever, shall be complete and absolute; and said State shall be entitled to one member in the House of Representatives in the Congress of the United States until the next census be taken by the Federal Government. But should the majority of votes be cast for 'proposition rejected,' it shall be deemed and held that the people of Kansas do not desire admission into the Union with said [Leocompton] CONSTITUTION, under the conditions set forth in said proposition; and in that event the people of said Territory are hereby authorized and empowered to form for themselves a Constitution and State Government by the name of the State of Kansas, according to the Federal Constitution, and may elect delegates for that purpose, to be not before the next census, but in a manner and by a process and legal title, as is ascertained, by a census duly and legally taken, that the population of said Territory equals the ratio of representation required for a member of the House of Representatives of the United States."

Boston, May 17.—The brig Windgold, arrived here, reports having been fired into, with a musket by a British cruiser, soon after leaving Siquerra in Havana. The vessel was afterwards boarded and searched by an armed boat's crew.
