THE WINANS NEW MODEL STEAMSHIP. The launch of the steamer, building by Messrs. Ross and Thomas Winans, mear the Ferry Bar, was steadily progressive throughout resterday, and she was moved on her ways about one hundred fest, the wheel-house being, when work was suspended last evening, submerged into the water. The ressel lying sideways to the water, the mode of launching is similar to that of the 'Levisthan,' on a smaller scale, but is nevertheless a very tedious undertaking, being slowly worked down by screws, which at the same time hold her back so as to prevent one end moving faster than the other. The work of launching will be resumed this morning, and the vessel will dred and eighty feet, shows to more advantage. Her triol trip, which can scarcely take place in less than two months after the lanneh,

will be looked for with great interest. The form of this vessel is so different from any that has yet been constructed, that it is a difficult matter to attempt to describe its peculiarities. With the understanding to commence with that the vessel, as she stands on the stocks, is precisely the shape of a good havana cigar, sharp at both ends, and one hundred and eighty feet long, and sixteen feet in diameter in the centre, unbroken in continuity, except by the wheel house, which passes around about six feet of its entire centre, above and below the water line, and over the top as well as under the bostom of the vessel, the following description may be understandable :

Take two elongated and sharp pointel two butt ends, which imagine to be the shaft of the water wheel, which passes into the two sugar loaves, and is driven by engines at each end of the shaft. 
