Some of the most- successful sugar-makers say, it is of the greatest importance in sugar making, that the same be reduced to syrup in the shortest possible time after being collected. Although the sap may not sonr in several days, its properties are undoubtedly affected by light, and air, and the amount of crystalizable matter con-iderably diminished, so that even if the 'run' be light for a few days, it is best to reduce to symplevery 8 or 12 hours. This precaution is even more necessary in the latter par of the season, when the sap eristalizes with more difficulty. By judicious boiling the available

run may be prolonged several days.

To "sugar off," the syrup should be strained through a thick woolen cloth into a medium seized kettle, and reduced slowly carefully guarding against burning, as this would greatly injure the color and quality of threads of the thicksyrup break off short like glass, after cooling quickly in water or snow.
