Agreeably to the foregoing resolution the undersigned invites the farmers of the County who are engaged in rearing pure blooded stock, to furnish him with the name, age, description and pedigree of every animal whether Durham, Devon, Alderney or Ayrshire, in order that a herd book may be kept, hence, for the inspection of the members, and others requiring information.

The County Poor House.

The people of the county are soon to pass upon the question of whether the poor of the county shall be supported in the manner that they now are, or whether they shall adopt the system now in operation in the larger part of the counties of the Commonwealth.

That our present system is radically defective does not admit of a doubt. The amount of poor tax levied and collected from the different townships in the county, for the last five years will average over ten thousand dollars per year and that must continue to increase with the growth of the county. By looking at the details of our Miss R. Hall. present evetem, it will be seen that a large portion of the amount is spent before it reaches the pauper. There are thirty-one townships and boroughs in the county, and about ninety overseers of the poor, and all of

them must be paid more or less for their services, and I think that the estimate would be a safe one that twenty per cent. of the whole sum is absorbed by the overseers of the poor for their services, expenses, dec. Another source of great expense, as well as a most vexatious anogance, is the litigation between the different townships in the county, to ascertain the legal settlement of the pauper, and of this most of the townships in the county have had ample experience. As soon as a man or his family is so unfortunate as qualities. All of, these articles are marked at to require assistance from the township, the overseers at once set to work to see if the last legal settlement of the pauper is not in some other district,-tax books are examin-

ed, old contracts are bunted up, and every point is carefully scrutinized by some wily attorney, and if the case will at all warrant it, the township at once commences proceedings to test the question before the courts, and af ter double the expense of maintaining the pauper is incurred by the respective townships-payment of lawyers' fees, traveling expenses, time of the overseers, &c.-the le gal settlement is at length ascertained. At low estimate, from five to ten per cent. of the whole poor tax of the county is spent in determining the liability of the township to support the pasper of the county. At the present time, as far as I am inform-

ed, no provision whatever, is made by any of the townships to provide for such persons as shall be chargeable thereon. The over-eers make the best shift they can, and often where a case occurs that is disagreeable or troublesome, they are compelled to pay double and treble what it is really worth, and what it would cost were there a proper county house, where all suitable things were provided and in readiness when required. Many of the paupers of the county, could, if there was an opportunity to labor when able, do a large part towards their support. But as the practice now is, they are hustled about from one to another, without regard to the wishes or feelings of the unfortunate pauper. Humanity should prompt every community to make ample and comfortable provisions for such as through misfortune are compelled to ask sid of their fellows. "The poor you have always with you," was said by Him who spake as never man spake, and in all truly Christian countries no system of laws have been established without suitable provisions for the support of the poor

and unfortunate. · The law, if adopted by the people, contemplates the purchase of a farm and the erection of suitable buildings thereon, that the needy and destitute may there find a comforta ble home, and it requires but a thought from any reflecting mind to satisfy him that the cost of supporting the poor of the county will be less than one-half of the present expenses. Many of the loweships in the county are now supporting paupers at from three to six dollars per week, because from the nature of their afflictions, persons are unwilling to receive them into their families at a fair price, when the actual cost in a properly arranged county house would not be one-third that the townships now pay. " The support of the poor through the means of a farm and county poor house is not an experiment. And I venture the prediction that the same tax that is now levied by the different townships, will in the space of three years, purchase a suitable farm and erect suitable buildings thereon, and support the poor far better than they now are and after that one-third of the poor tax we now raise will be amply sufficient for all the purposes of keeping it in successful op-
