Schools of Pennsylvania. The annual report of Henry C. Hickok, Superintendent of Common Schools, states the whole number of schools in the State, exclusive of Philadelphia, to be 11,485; being an increase over the last year of 203, and of 1298 over the year 1854. The average tenden, Douglas, Fitch, Fitzpatrick, Green, length of time the schools have been open is reported at five months and nine days, against five months and seven and a half days last year. The whole number of teachers in the Wigfall -31. State, including Philadelphia, is 14,071.-These are divided into male, 8431; female, 5640. The average monthly salaries of male teachers is \$24.86, of female teachers \$17,19. The whole number of pupils in the Common Schools, exclusive of Philadelphia, is 575,857. Increase over the last year, 5371. Including Philadelphia, the total is 634,651. Amount expended for purchasing ground, building - school houses, renting, repairing, &c., \$531,-.413. Amount expended for tuition, fuel and coetingencies, exclusive of Philadelphia, \$1,-571, 880. Increase over last year, \$83, 210. Including Philadelphia, the sum expended in
