CALIFORNIA ITEMS.
TERRY'S TRIAL.—In the Fourth Dis-
trict Court on June 11, the matter of first
importance was the motion for a change of
venue for the trial of David Terry, for
fighting a duel with Broderick. The af-
fidavits were put in on Friday. Judge Ha-
ger, in deciding the motion, remarked:
"Upon reading the affidavits filed by the
defendant I have been pretty well con-
vinced that a proper and impartial trial
unbiased jury could not be obtained to
try this case in this county. The Supreme
Court in several of its recent decisions has
held that men who have formed opinions
from reading mere newspaper reports, al-
though they know nothing of the transac-
tions of their own knowledge, are incap-
able of sitting as jurors."
The result, that I grant this motion
and transfer the cause from this county,
to one in which the most impartial jury
I believe exists of obtaining an impartial
jury in this county. The law then pro-
vides that the case shall be transferred to
the nearest county to which the same ob-
jection does not apply, and the only ques-
tion is, to which other county shall it be
sent. I am inclined to think that Alameda
and San Mateo counties are perhaps fully
as objectionable, and for the same reasons
as this. Marin and Contra Costa are,
therefore, the only remaining adjoining
counties. I cannot say I have any objec-
tion to either, and agree to either, or to
either of these, or any other county that
may be most convenient, or as they see fit,
and I will order the transfer accordingly.

The cause was transferred to Marin Co.
BRODERICK'S WILL.—The sealed de-
positions taken by Commissioner John K.
Hackett, at New York, with reference to
the will of Broderick, were opened on
June 18, in the Probate Court. From
the contents of the depositions therein
contained, it appears that the will of the
late Senator, which gave John A. McHenry
\$10,000, and the residue of his estate to
George Wilkes, was drawn by A. A. Phil-
lips, (formerly Judge of the Marine Court),
at Mr. Broderick's request, and in his
presence, in the Metropolitan Hotel in New
York, on the 24th of January, 1859; that
John J. Hoff of Holoken accidentally came
in on the witness stand to testify, at Broderick's
solicitation. Broderick charged them to
regard the matter as entirely confidential,
and both of them affirm that they never
made mention of the will until after Brod-
erick's death. No other persons were
present but the witnesses when the will
was signed. Both testified that they
knew of the friendly relations between
Broderick and Wilkes; neither knew
when the will was found. Broderick told
him that it was his, and he signed, and nei-
ther knew it again until about the last of
January, when Hoff was shown it that he
might identify his own signature.
