I do not anticipate, nor do I deem it possible in the present condition of the country, that, under the Administration of Lincoln, any act will be perpetrated that would destroy or impair the Constitutional rights of the citizen, or invade the reserved rights of the States upon the subject of slavery; but, if I should find myhave no hesitation in expressing my deliberate conviction that such an outrage would not only make the Southern people a unit, but would arouse and consolidate all the conservative elements of the North in firm and determined resistance by the overwhelming majorities. In such an event the Sonth would occupy an impregnable position. With her own people united and animated by one sentiment—the unfaltering resolve to maintain and defend their rights and liberties as won by the blood of their fathers, and guaranteed by the Constitution of their country, they could safely rely upon the justice of their cause and confidently expect the sympathy of the civilized world and the choicest blessings of divine Providence while struggling for the right.
