The New Fugitive Slave Law. In the Senate on Monday Mr. Douglas asked and obtained leave to introduce a bill amendatory of and supplemental to the acts of the 12th of February, 1793 and the 12th of September, 1850, in respect to the rendition of fugitives from justice and service.

It is also provided that the words "treason, felony and other crimes" shall be construed to include all offences committed within and against the State or Territory making the demand, whether the acts charged were criminal or not in the State where the fugitive was

Section 2 provides for giving the fugitive slave a jury trial in the State or Tergitory from which he fled.

SECTION 3 provides that when, through violence or intimidation, a fugitive slave shall not be recovered, the owner may bring suit for and recover the value in the Court of Claims, the amount to be paid from the United States Treasury, the Solicitor thereof to bring suit, in the name of the United States, against the county, city or muncipality, where the recovery was prevented, for the amount-

paid for such fugitive.

No matter how wrong secession may be, it is an accomplished fact.

The Southern Convention, in session at Montgomery, Alabama, have adopted a Constitution, and elected Jefferson Davis, late U. S. Senator of Mississippi, President, and Alexander H. Stephens, of Georgia, Vice President. The constitution is mainly framed after the U.S. Constitution, and the following are some clauses :--

The importation of African negroes from any foreign country other than the Slaveholding States of the United States is hereby forbidden, and Congress is required to pass such laws as shall effectually prevent the same.

Congress shall also have power to prohibit the introduction of slaves from any State not a member of this Confederacy.
