The War Commenced. FORT SUMTER CAPTURED!!

Telegraphic dispatches from Charleston nounce the commencement of civil war. The public mind is so fully prepared for the event that it will occasion http://www. prise. The course of the Administration, in determining to throw supplies into Fort Sumpter, and, for aught that is known to the contrary, to re-enforce it with men and munitions, has hastened the crisis and prompted the authorities of the Confederate States to attempt its reduction when it could do so with the least loss of life and the best prospect of success. The facts, as reported by telegraph, are briefly as follows: On Thursday, (11th) a cor-respondence took place between General Beauregard and Major Anderson, in which to prevent unnecessary effusion of blood, the former proposed that the fort should be surrendered as soon as its supplies were exhausted. To this proposal Major Anderson refused to accede, and no further negotiations took place. Friday morning at 44 o'clock the batteries in the harbor

one o'clock, when Maj. Anderson struck his flag and surrendered the Fort. The revolutionists allowed him to keep his sword, and to depart to any point he de-sired. About 8 o'clock Fort Sumter took fire, and a boat was sent by Gen. Beauregard to his aid; but no help was sent by the federal fleet outside the harbor. Anderson's flag was shot down, when the Carolinans gallantly sent him another to fight under. Fort Sumter is much injured, and five men of her men wounded, but no lives lost. Anderson will sail for
