The Battle at Ball's Bluff Near Leesburg.

The accounts of the unfortunate engagement near Leesburg on Monday evening, in which General Baker was killed are exceedingly conflicting. On the one hand it is represented that our forces were really successful, and gained a most important strategic point, and that our losses were not really so heavy as at first represented. Other accounts state that the battle was a most serious disaster—an utter rout, and that more than half of the troops engaged on our side were killed, wounded, taken prisoners or drowned in attempting to swim across the Potomac.
