VINELAND SETTLEMENT.

The following is an extract from the report of solon Robinson. Esq. published in the New York 77-1 buns. In reference to Vineland. All persons can read this report with interest.

Advantages of Farming near Home-Vineland-Remarks upon Marl-Soil, its great Fartility-The Cause of Fertility-Amount of Crops Produced-Practical Evidence.

It is certainly one of the most extensive fertile tracts, in an almost level position, and saltable condition for pleasant farming that we know of this side of the western prairies. We found some of the oldest farms apparently just as profubly productive as when first cleared of forest fifty or a hundred years ago.

The geologist would soon discover the cause of this continued fertility. The whole country is a marine deposit, and all through the soil we found evidences of calcarcous substances, generally in the

posit, and all through the soil we found evidences of cal-careous substances, generally in the form of indulated calcareous mart, showing many distinct forms of ancient shells, of the territary formation; and this marly substance is scattered all through the soil, in a very comminuted form, and in the exact condition most easily assimilated by such plants as the farmer desires to entitivate. Mark, in all its forms has been used to fertilize crops in England, from the time it was occupied by the Romans; and in France and Germany a mari bed is counted on as a valuable bed of manure, that can be dig and carted and apread over the field. How much more valuable then it must be when found already mixed through the soil
