Sm Texans at Parillo, on the Rio Grande, where the Texans had fortified themselves. The enemy were deteated. Our loss was twentr-five killed and wounded. The Rebel loss has not been ascertained. Gen. Canby with a portion of his command, had made a detour and got below the enemy, while Major Paul was in the rear. The whole of the enemy's command will probably be taken, as their only alternative is to surrender or flee to the mountains, where the Indians await them.

Two important bills passed the Senate last week; the homestead bill which now becomes a law, with the President's approval, and a Pacific Railroad bill.

The Fight at New Orleans.

The particulars of the bombardment of Forta Jackson and St. Phillip, which preceded the capture of New Orleans, are received by way of Havana. The hombard-ment appears to have been all that the rebels represented it to be-one of the most terrible that ever took place, continuing unwards of a week, day and night. O Reiday, the 25th, the fire of the forts was so much slackened as 'to allow of the pas sage up the river of a number of Com Farragut's vessels, including frigates and ganhouts, which succeeded, after some desperate fighting with the rebel gunboats in clearing the river to New Orleanssinking and otherwise destroying eleven of the enemy's vessels, and demolishing the famous ram Manassas, which was completely riddled thy broadsides from the steamer Mississippi. The rebel forts, though thus out off entirely from communication with the city, refused at first to surrender unconditionally; but subsequently concluded to do so.
