REPORT OF SOLON ROBINSON. OF THE NEW YORK TRIBUNE.

VINELAND SETTLEMENT The following is she extract from the report of Solon Robinson. Eq., published in the New York: Twibuns, in reference to Vincland. All persons can read this report with interest. this report with interest.

Advantages of Farming near Home—Vineland—Bemarks upon Marl—Soil, its great Pertility—The

marks upon Marl—Soil, its great Pertility—The Cause of Fertility—Amount of Crops Produced—Practical Evidence.

It is certainly one of the most extensive fertile tracts, in an almost level positios, and enleable condition for pleasant farming that we know of this idee of the western prairies. We found some of the oldest farms apparently just as profitably productive as when first cleared of forestrifty or a hundred years ago.

The geologist would some discover the cause of this continued fertility. The phole country is a marine deposit, and all through the soil we found evidences of chicareous substances, generally in the form of indulated calcareous marl, showing many distinct forma of ancient shells, of the tertiary formation; and this marly substance is ecutered all through the soil, in a very comminated form, and in the exact condition most easily assimilated by such plants—as the farmer desires to cultivate.

Marl, in all its forms has been used to fertilize crops in England, from the time it was occupied by the Romans; and in France and Germany a marl bed is counted on as a valuable bed of manure, that can be dug and carted and spread over the field.
