

Our next visit was to the large farm of Andrew Sharp, on 270 acres. In less than three years he has got 231 acres cleared and in crops this scason, all well inclosed and divided into several fields, with "edar rail or polar fence, has built a two-story dwelling, about thirty-six or forty feet, and a smaller house for farm isborers, and a stable and granary and some other outbuildings.
