4. All property lawfully taken from the property, and must be used and accounted for as such. The fifty-second article of war authorizes the penalty of death for pillage or plundering, and other articles anthorize severe punishments for any officer or soldier who shall embezzle, misap-ply or waste military stores; or who shall permit the waste or misapplication of any such public property. The penalty is the same whether the offence be committed in

5. All property, public or private, taken Officers will be held strictly accountable 6. When foraging parties are sent out

for provisions or other stores, the commanding officer of such party will be held accountable for the conduct of his command, and will make a true report of all property taken.

7. No officer or soldier will, without authority, leave his colors or ranks to take personal property, or to enter a private house for that purpose. All such acts are punishable with death, and an officer who permits them is equally as guilty as the actual pillagers.
8. Commanding officers of armies and
