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REPORT OF SOLON ROBINSON.

OF THE NEW YORK TRIBUNE,
UTON THE
VINELAND SETTLEMENT. The following is an extract from the report of Solon Robinson. Esq., published in the New York. Tribuns, in reference to Vincland. All persons can read this report with interest. Advantages of Farming near Home—Vine land—Remarks upon Marl—Seil, its great, Ferbility—The Gause of Fertility—Amount of Greps Produced—Practical Evidence.

It is certainly one of the most extensive fertile tracts, in an simust level position, and suitable colidition for pleasant farming that we know of this side of the western prairies. We found some of the oldest farms apparently just as profitably productive as when first cleared of forcet fifty or a hundred years ago.

The geologist would soon discaver the cause of this continued fertility. The whole equantry is a marine deposit, and all through the soil we found evidences of calcarcous substances, generally in the form of industed calcarcous und, showing many distinct forms of ancient shells, of the tertiary formation: and this marly substance is exattered all through the soil, in a very comminued form, and in the exact condition most easily assimilated for the plants as the farmer desires to cultivate.

Marl, in all its forms has been used to fertilize crops in England, from the time it was occupied by the Romans; and in France and Germany a marl bed is counted on as a valuable bed of manure, that can be dug and carted and spread over the field. How much more valuable then it must be when found already mixed through the soil, where new particles will be turned up and exposed, and transformed to the owner's use every time he stire the earth.

Having then satisfied our minds with the care, they will not be excited with wonder at seeing indubitable evidence of fertility of a soil which in our situations, having the same general characteristics or at least appearances, is entirely unremunerative except as his productive news is promoted by artificial fertilization.

A few words about the quality and value of this land for cultivation, of which we have some strong proof.

Our drat visit was to william D. Wilson, Franklin township, Gloucester county, who purchased some eight miles north of Miytille, about three years ago, for the purpose of establishing a steam

Mr. Wilson's growing crops, and the wheat stubble of the present season, all indicate his land as productive as any part of the State.

At Mary Barrow's, an old-style Jersey woman farmer, several miles south of Mr. Wilson's, we were so partientarly struck with the fine appearance of a field ofcorn, that we stopped to inquire of the hired man how it was produced. We found that the land had been the year, but one before in wheat, sown with clover, and this -cut one season, and last spring plowed once, with one "psor old nag," and planted with corn.

"Yes, but you knamered high, we suppose?" we said interrogatively, and got his reply;—
"Waal, you see, we couldn't done that; 'cause we hadn't but forty-one horse loads altogether, for 23 acres, and we wanted the most on't for the truck.

The truck consisted of beets, carrots, cabbage, encumbers, mellons, &c., and a very productive patch of Limberna, grown for marketing. Our next visit was to the large farm of Andrew Sharp, five miles north of Millville, from half to a mile cast of the railroad, and just about in the centre of Vinciand.

Mr. Sharp commenced work here is December, 1858, upon 270 acres. In less than three, years he has goi 231 acres cleared and in grope this season, all well inclosed and divided into several fields, with cedar rail or pole fence; has built a two-story dwelling, about, thirty-six or forty feet, and a smaller fiones for farm laborers, and a stable and granity and some other outbuildings.

Considerable part of the land was cleared for the plow at 20 dollars an acre, and on some of it the first crop was buck wheat, linied with 50 bushels in powder per acre.
