

THANKING GOD FOR OUR DEFEATS.
Mr. Trumbull, the Republican Senator from Illinois, recently made a speech in Michigan in which he "thanked God that the Federal arms were defeated at Bull Run, and on the Peninsula, and under Pope, for without such defeats we should not have had the Emancipation Proclamation. He said we won at Bull Run, or at least Richmond, he said the back-bone of the rebellion would have been broken, and the Union would have been restored with slavery remaining in it."
