Our wounded men who were left on the field, since brought over, state that the privates treated them kindly, and expressed the same feelings in regard to the war as those above mentioned.

I think that this war must come to an end soon; but rather than have the North give one inch, I would stay the remainder of my time, and longer if necessary, provided I am permitted to live so long. did not come here for mere pastime, or to make money, (as many have,) but I to fight for the right, and to sustain our government. I have been kept and preserved from all harm so far, as I hope I is good, though I am not so fleshy as I was in the winter. The weather has been very warm the most of this month.

I did not get a furlough as I expected. The reason is because there are too many away now from this corps.
