ALL PROBLISCHY NOVES whether for a sum less or greater than twenty dollars, must be stamped when executed; and the maker of a note who fails to a penity of fifty dollars for each offense, besides the value of the proper stamp.

The payee of a Note, and the grantee of a Deed which is delivered unstamped, may immediately upon accepting the delivery of such note or deed, affix and cancel the proper stamp, but this does not relieve the maker of such note or the granter of such note or the granter of such note or the granter of such and cancelling the proper stamp.
