THE WAR.

We publish this morning a despatch from our special correspondent at Knoxville, dated January 30th, and via Chattanooga to date of Feb. 3d.

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On the second instant, the Federal steamer Haron captured the schooner Silvanus, in Doboy Bay, Georgia. The vessel was sunk by the Federal gunboat.

The office of the Mahoning (O.) Register, published at Youngstown, Pa., was destroyed on Friday night by a mob, led by a number of prominent abolitionists.

A dispatch from Washington announces the statements of apprehended candidates with France are without foundation.

Dr. Stuart Gwynn, who was arrested on the charge of improper transportation in connection with the Treasury Department, was freed on Friday night.

Eight tons of greenbacks were carried over the New Jersey Railroad to Washington one day last week. The money is said to be the collections of different internal revenue offices.

We have heard of one Copperhead in the sense in which the Administration papers use the epithet. It's the Abolition contractor for copper in Brooklyn, who tried to bribe an honest clerk to enter up 10,000 lbs. of copper to his credit without any delivery.

At the city election in Lancaster on Tuesday last, Mayor Sanderson was re-elected by a majority of one hundred and seventeen, being an increase of sixty-eight since last October.
